AMENDED PETITION FOR EXECUTIVE CLEMENCY (NON-PUBLIC HEARING REQUESTED)

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I. Nature of the Petition

Petitioner Edgar Naranjo, by his attorney Steven A. Drizin and law students, Megan Grenville, Marissa Jackson, and Alix Johnson, of Northwestern University School of Law's Bluhm Legal Clinic, respectfully applies, pursuant to Article 5, Section 12 of the Illinois Constitution and 730 ILCS 5/3-3-13 and the rules of the Illinois Prisoner Review Board, for a grant of executive clemency in the form of a commutation of sentence to time-served. Edgar is currently serving a forty-year sentence for first-degree murder (felony murder) and has served over eighteen years of that sentence. His projected outdate is September 27, 2042. Edgar submitted a petition for executive clemency on October 13, 2020. It is docket number 36712. This is intended to serve as an addendum to his *pro se* petition.

This is yet another case in a long line of cases highlighting the unfairness of Illinois' felony-murder law and the ways in which the rule, when coupled with Illinois' harsh mandatory sentencing laws, leads to punishments that are disproportionate to the crime. The unfairness of the felony murder rule is especially apparent in cases like Edgar's, where Edgar is serving murder-time because a Chicago police officer shot and killed Johnny Salazar, his fourteen-year-old accomplice, as Edgar and Johnny fled on foot from a failed attempted robbery and home invasion. The unfairness of applying the felony murder rule to such circumstances alone would be a powerful ground for commutation. But, since Edgar's conviction and sentence, new facts have emerged, and new laws have been enacted which only underscore the unfairness of his sentence.

First, facts have emerged which cast doubt on the police narrative of the events that led to Johnny's death, including the narrative given to the press by police spokesperson Pat Camden in the immediate aftermath of the shooting and the narrative put forth by the Cook County State's Attorney at Edgar's bail hearing and at trial. These new facts – many of which emerged during the successful wrongful death civil lawsuit filed by the family of Johnny Salazar¹ – cast an entirely different light on the crime and, more importantly, on whether Officer Rafael Balbontin was justified in using deadly force against Edgar and Johnny.²

Second, in the past year, Illinois has enacted the SAFE-T Act, a new omnibus criminal justice reform bill which, among other things, has changed the law of felony murder. Because at the time of Edgar's offense, Illinois applied the strictest form of liability for felony murder, extending it to cases where a third-party kills an accomplice during the course of a felony, defendants, like Edgar, were often over-punished. The "proximate cause" theory of liability in use at the time of Edgar's arrest, has come under intense criticism in recent years, especially in cases in which police officers or other third parties kill a suspected felon's accomplices.³ This criticism led to the changes enacted by the SAFE-T Act, which now prevents the felony murder rule from being used in cases where third parties, like police officers, intervene in crimes and kill

Unfortunately for Edgar, such transparency did not exist at the time of Salazar's death and it took until years after his conviction, during the civil suit filed by Salazar's family, for the truth about the shooting to be revealed.

co-actors. Although the law is not retroactive, this Board and Governor can consider the fact that Edgar would likely not be charged with felony murder if he committed his crime today, in assessing whether his forty-year sentence fits his crime.

Third, in the wake of the police shootings of Laquan McDonald and Breonna Taylor and the unlawful use of deadly force by Minneapolis police officer Derek Chauvin in the killing of George Floyd, policymakers around the country are focusing on tightening the circumstances under which police officers can use deadly force. The SAFE-T Act contained new provisions aimed at clarifying the circumstances under which police officers can use deadly force against felons fleeing from their crimes. Under these provisions, police officers may no longer use deadly force against fleeing felons unless officers have reason to believe that the fleeing felons cannot be apprehended later and that they are likely to cause great bodily harm to another person. Neither of these circumstances existed in Edgar's case and today, Officer Balbontin's shooting of Salazar and Edgar would be given much greater scrutiny and likely would not have been deemed "justified."

Fourth, Edgar's forty-year sentence seems especially unfair when compared to the sentence that Officer Balbontin later received after he intentionally stabbed his wife to death and stabbed his mother-in-law when she tried to intervene on January 18, 2005. For his premeditated and planned murder, Officer Balbontin was sentenced to only twenty-five years in prison – fifteen years less than Edgar is serving for felony murder, caused by Officer Balbontin's fatal shooting of Johnny. Edgar should not be required to serve more time for his less serious crime of an attempted home invasion than Officer Balbontin is currently serving for his brutal and senseless murder.

Finally, Edgar has proven to be a model individual during his time in prison and will positively contribute to society upon release. He has a strong support system waiting for him in Mexico, where he will move once released.

II. Required Information

A. The Relevant Conviction

In October 2002, Edgar was charged with first-degree felony murder, home invasion, residential burglary and attempted armed robbery in Cook County. His criminal case number is No. 02CR27730. On February 24, 2004, Edgar was convicted of residential burglary and first-degree felony murder predicated on home invasion and sentenced to forty years for murder, and ten years for residential burglary, to be served concurrently, by Judge Diana L. Kenworthy.

Absent the felony murder count, Edgar would still face the home invasion conviction under 720 ILCS 5/19-6, which typically carries a sentencing range of six to thirty years. Because Edgar did not carry or discharge a firearm, or otherwise injure anyone, he would likely not be subject to any enhancements and as such would receive a sentence at the lower end or middle of that range. To date, Edgar has served eighteen years of his forty-year sentence, meaning he has already served more time than he likely would have received for the home invasion. His projected parole date is September 27, 2042 and his projected discharge date is September 27, 2045. Edgar has no pending court appeals at this time.

Edgar is a Mexican national, he is not married and has never served in the military. His state prisoner number is R28771, and his last known social security number is 357-80-3568⁴. His mailing address is:

B. Prior Criminal History

On information and belief,⁵ Edgar has the following criminal history; none of these arrests resulted in a felony conviction. On March 9, 1993, Edgar was arrested for retail theft. Edgar was seventeen years old and was preparing for homecoming. He and a friend went to JC Penney, and Edgar stole a tie and suspenders. This charge was stricken off with leave to reinstate. On November 13, 1995, Edgar was arrested for possession of a controlled substance. After being pulled over driving, the police saw a crushed green plant, five capsules of suspected LSD, and seven small packets of suspected LSD.⁶ On May 21, 1998, Edgar was arrested for possession of a firearm and two counts of attempt.⁷ Police reports indicate this was a stun gun.⁸ He pleaded guilty to two misdemeanor counts of possession of a firearm. He had a \$100 fine. The counts on attempt were nolle prosequi. On February 25, 1999, Edgar was arrested for producing a fraudulent insurance card.⁹ On May 19, 2001, Edgar was arrested for domestic

battery. The charges were stricken off with leave to reinstate. On July 10, 2002, Edgar was arrested for battery.¹⁰

C. Non-Public Hearing

Edgar Naranjo requested a public hearing in his *pro se* petition filed on October 13, 2020. Edgar would now like to request a non-public hearing on his petition for clemency due to the fact that public hearings are not occurring due to COVID-19. Edgar requests that the Prisoner Review Board and Governor Pritzker diligently consider Edgar's petition at the earliest possible time.

III. Personal Life History

Edgar Naranjo was born on September 1, 1976 in Mexico City to his parents, Zenaido and Celia Naranjo. The couple was married in Mexico City, and had three children together: two sons and one daughter. They migrated to the United States in 1982, when Edgar was six years old, with hopes of giving the family a better future. The family moved to the Little Village neighborhood on Chicago's southside, where they became employed in the food industry. By 1990, Edgar's parents had opened a Mexican Restaurant, Greenhouse Steaks. Growing up, Edgar recalls being very close to his family. Edgar went to neighborhood public schools for elementary and middle school. He attended Bogan High School, beginning in the 9th grade, and graduated in 1995. Edgar always loved his English and Spanish classes.

As early as he can remember, Edgar worked in the family business to help support his parents and siblings. In 1990, when Greenhouse Steaks opened, he began working there. His parents had strong work ethics, were always attentive to his personal needs, and made sure he

had everything he needed to give himself a good life. Though his parents cared for him very much, he became overwhelmed by the hard work. Edgar often worked fifteen-hour days at the restaurant, while also juggling school. Weekends provided no respite from work. On the weekends, he worked at a local flea market, selling his parents' food.

At seventeen, Edgar moved out of his parents' house. This is where his troubles began. He started experimenting with drugs and began making bad, impulsive choices. Edgar soon became addicted to cocaine. When Edgar's parents learned of his drug addiction, they intervened, sending him to Mexico, where he was admitted into a twelve-step rehabilitation program. Edgar successfully completed the program and apologized to his parents. They forgave him and agreed to allow him to move back into their house to start over once his treatment was completed.

Edgar hoped to go home, find a job, and marry his childhood sweetheart and girlfriend. However, when Edgar returned to Chicago, he discovered that his girlfriend had started a relationship with someone else. He took this news very hard, and, unsure how to cope with pain, he relapsed and turned to drugs. Edgar was under the influence of marijuana and cocaine at the time of the crime.

Edgar has never served in the military and has never been married. He has remained extremely close to his parents, his sister, Yuri Martinez, and his brother, Alex Naranjo.

IV. The Offense A. Offense on October 4, 2002

At the time of the offense, Edgar was, at twenty-six years old, in the throes of his drug addiction. He had been kicked out of his parents' home and was living in the basement of the

family home of his friend, Juan "Johnny" Salazar. Edgar needed money to support his addiction and to survive. Strung out and broke, Edgar came up with an idea to make some quick money by robbing a man who sold colognes at the flea market where he worked.

On the rainy morning of October 4, 2002, Edgar borrowed his cousin's car. Edgar then returned to the Salazar home and picked up Johnny, who was fourteen years old at the time. The pair had previously discussed the robbery, and Johnny had insisted on coming along. The pair had no real plan. Edgar knew Juan Balbontin from the flea market where his family worked. Juan sold colognes at the flea market, and the pair were hoping to steal some of the bottles of cologne and then sell them for a profit. The plan was filled with holes; they did not know how or where they would actually sell the colognes, or even how they would transport them from the Balbontins' home. They did not even bring anything with them to carry the colognes.

After picking Johnny up, but before proceeding to Juan Balbontin's house, Johnny called to make sure Juan was home. Juan's son, Rafael Balbontin, who, unbeknownst to either of the men, was a rookie Chicago police officer, answered the telephone and handed it to his father.

Rafael and his wife and child were living in the basement of the Balbontin family home at the time of the offense. After handing the phone to his father, Rafael retired to the basement.

Edgar and Johnny then drove to the home of Juan and Juana Balbontin on the 3000 block of North New England Avenue. When they got there, the two men parked the car down the street from the Balbontin home. They both wore bright yellow rain ponchos and face masks, and Johnny carried an unloaded BB gun which Edgar had purchased at a local flea market.

What was planned to be only a quick and simple robbery quickly turned into a deadly police-involved shooting. Johnny knocked on the door. Juan's wife, Juana, answered the door, and Edgar and Johnny forced their way into the house. After Juana began screaming, Edgar told her to "shut up" while Johnny was pointing the BB gun at her. Juan heard the commotion and ran to her rescue, striking Edgar from his blind-side with a mop wringer.

Things happened so fast, catching both Edgar and Johnny by surprise, and they didn't know what to do at the time. Johnny attempted to take the mop wringer from Juan, at which time, his wife, Juana, yelled in Spanish "they have a gun," and started to scream. Hearing his mother's screams, Rafael Balbontin, a rookie Chicago Police officer, who had been on the police force for only ten months, grabbed his service gun and ran upstairs to help his mother. Edgar and Johnny panicked, fled the house, and took off running down the street. In total, they were in the home for only a few minutes. Edgar never even saw Officer Rafael Balbontin in the home. He and Johnny had already abandoned their plan.

Officer Balbontin followed Edgar and Johnny outside and yelled, "Chicago Police, freeze." The men continued to flee. When they did not stop, Officer Balbontin aimed and fired, shooting eight bullets in their direction. His reckless barrage of bullets killed Johnny with two shots and wounded Edgar in the right hand. He even accidentally shot his own father, who was in the line of fire, in the right shoulder. After Johnny fell to the ground, Edgar picked Johnny up, helped him into the car, and drove away.

As Edgar was driving down the expressway, he threw the BB gun and the yellow ponchos out of the car's window. Edgar then drove to an industrial area where he placed Johnny's lifeless body on a curb and left. Edgar continued home, threw his sweatshirt and hat

into a garbage can and drove himself to the hospital to have the gunshot wound on his hand treated. The hospital staff alerted law enforcement authorities that a person arrived with a gunshot wound, and the police soon arrived and questioned him. At first, Edgar made up a story to explain his injury, sending the officers off on a bogus chase. However, when the officers returned to question Edgar further, the weight of feelings of guilt caused him to break down and confess to the home invasion.

B. The Chicago Police Department's Inconsistent Version of Events

In the immediate aftermath of the shooting, Pat Camden, a police spokesperson, gave interviews to the press about the circumstances of the shooting. He described Officer Rafael Balbontin's actions as "heroic" and said that Edgar and Johnny both had guns ("the two had guns"). According to Camden, a police panel had cleared Balbontin, finding that he had acted "in fear of his life." A few days later, at Edgar's bail hearing, a Cook County Assistant State's Attorney embellished the story even further, telling the court that "one of them turned and pulled the trigger several times, but the gun did not fire." At a later date, Camden told the press that after Balbontin identified himself as a police officer, "he saw one of the two with a gun."

Based on information discovered in Salazar's civil suit, we now know that each of these accounts was untrue. In his deposition in connection with the Salazar family's civil suit, Officer Balbontin said he was off-duty and laying on his bed in his parent's basement when Edgar and Johnny entered the home. He hadn't worked that day or the day before and remembered feeling

"fully refreshed" the day of the offense. He heard the commotion of the entry, heard his mother shout "they have a gun" in Spanish, and ran upstairs. As he approached the first floor, he saw Edgar and Johnny running out the front door. He could not see their hands or arms because they were covered by yellow rain ponchos. At no point during his brief, deadly encounter with the two men did he see any sign of any weapon. 16

According to Balbontin, after the men had run a few paces outside of the house, he yelled, "Chicago Police, freeze," and, according to Balbontin, Edgar and Johnny both came to a complete stop. ¹⁷ Officer Balbontin testified that that Johnny, "jerked real quick and made a furtive movement" when he told him to freeze. ¹⁸ At that moment, Officer Balbontin, who had never fired his service weapon on the job before, fired eight shots. ¹⁹

The evidence does not support key aspects of Mr. Camden's account,²⁰ Officer

Balbontin's account, or the account described by the Assistant State's Attorney at Edgar's bail hearing. First, Johnny's autopsy revealed that he was shot in the back, which is inconsistent with

both Officer Balbontin's account of Johnny turning toward him and "crouching a little" and with the statement made by the Assistant State's Attorney that "one of them turned" toward Balbontin. Second, there is no evidence that both offenders had guns, that either offender pointed a gun at Balbontin, or that either offender attempted to fire a gun at Balbontin. In his deposition for the civil suit, Officer Balbontin testified that the two men *did not pose any threat to his life until he chased them and yelled "Chicago Police; Freeze,"* and that he never saw either of the men holding a weapon. Additionally, although Officer Balbontin stated he did not fire until after he confronted them and began to fear for his life, physical evidence was presented in the civil suit that indicated Balbontin started firing at the doorway. ²³

This new evidence not only demonstrates that the narratives of law enforcement kept changing, but it also raises questions about the Chicago Police Department's quick decision to clear Balbontin and find that the shooting was justified. If Balbontin never saw a gun and if neither man stopped and turned to face Balbontin, and if he did, in fact, open fire from the doorway, his belief that he feared for his life was not reasonable under the circumstances.

The CPD held an internal roundtable meeting the evening of the offense to determine whether the shooting was justified, but little is known about its details. Officer Balbontin provided a brief statement during this roundtable meeting, after which he was put on probation, but took only two or three days off from work.²⁴

C. Trial and Subsequent Attempts at Relief

On October 4, 2002, Edgar was arrested and charged with first-degree felony murder predicated on home invasion and residential burglary. Following a bench trial, Edgar was convicted of first-degree murder. He was sentenced to forty years for murder and received a ten-year sentence for residential burglary; the sentences were to run concurrently. Edgar's murder conviction and sentence were affirmed on direct appeal.²⁵

Over the years, Edgar has filed numerous appeals and post-conviction pleadings challenging his conviction and sentence. On direct appeal, Edgar argued that 1) the State did not prove felony murder beyond a reasonable doubt; and 2) his conviction for felony murder violated the one-act, one-crime rule.²⁶ The appellate court affirmed his murder conviction but vacated Edgar's conviction and sentence for residential burglary based on the one-act, one-crime rule.²⁷ Edgar subsequently filed a Petition for Leave to Appeal to the Illinois Supreme Court, arguing that the proximate cause theory of liability in criminal convictions afforded him less rights than a similarly situated defendant in a civil case, but was denied.²⁸

After exhausting all of his state court remedies on direct appeal, Edgar filed for Post-Conviction Relief, alleging six grounds for relief: 1) the indictment did not set forth the elements of the statute in violation of the Due Process clauses of the United States and Illinois Constitutions; 2) the State failed to prove him guilty of first degree murder; 3) ineffective representation by trial counsel for failing to contest the indictment; 4) ineffective representation by appellate counsel for failing to raise the ineffectiveness of trial counsel; 5) ineffective

representation by appellate counsel for failing to contest invalidity of indictment; and that 6) the order of the Appellate Court affirming his conviction denied him the right to know the nature and cause of the accusation and violated due process.²⁹ The post-conviction court dismissed the petition without giving Edgar an evidentiary hearing.³⁰

Edgar appealed the decision of the circuit court arguing that: 1) the indictment did not properly charge a crime; 2) the State failed to prove him guilty of first-degree murder; and 3) the affirmance of the conviction by the appellate court violated due process.³¹ The Appellate Court affirmed the dismissal of his petition.³² Edgar's subsequent petition for leave to appeal to the Illinois Supreme Court was also denied.³³

In 2009, Edgar filed a Writ for Habeas Corpus Relief in federal court, alleging that 1) his indictment was insufficient because it did not set forth all the elements of first-degree murder; 2) the affirmation of his conviction by the Illinois Appellate Court was outside the scope of the first-degree murder statute; and 3) the State did not prove all the elements of first-degree murder beyond a reasonable doubt.³⁴ This petition was denied by the court.³⁵ He subsequently filed a notice of appeal, which was also denied.³⁶

In 2019, Edgar filed a Successive Petition for Post-Conviction Relief, but the trial court refused to allow him to file another petition.³⁷ By November 6, 2020, Edgar had exhausted all of state court legal remedies. His only remaining option is clemency.

V. Personal Statement

My name is Edgar Naranjo. I was born on September 1, 1976, in Mexico City to Zenaido and Celia Naranjo. My parents have been married for 44 years. Since the day I was born they have set an incredible example for my brother, sister, and me, and have provided me with unconditional love. To this day, my family and I remain very close.

At six years old, my parents moved our family to the United States, to try to give us a better life. I grew up on the Southside of Chicago, in the Little Village Neighborhood, where I attended school and worked at my family's restaurant. As soon as I was old enough, I worked at the family business, sometimes for 15 hours a day. I also worked on the weekends at a local flea market selling our food. My parents thought it was very important to pass their work ethic on to us. As a young boy, this was hard. I was juggling both work and school, and also just wanted to be a teenager. At 17, the pressure had gotten to me. I moved out of my parents' home and began making bad decisions and experimenting with drugs. I became addicted to the drugs and my life spiraled out of control. The unconditional love of my parents led them to try to help me, by sending me to a rehabilitation program in Mexico. When I completed the program, I thought I would return to Chicago and start a new life. I apologized to my parents and was hoping to

reconnect with my girlfriend, marry her and start a family of my own. However, after returning, my girlfriend had moved on. I again turned to drugs and started making bad decisions.

There is no excuse for the bad decisions I made, and I cannot justify what I did. However, I know now that I was extremely immature at this time in my life. When I got to prison and was living with men the same age as me, I realized I did not speak, think, or act like them. I prayed to God that I would start to mature. I began to see clearly that I was underdeveloped, compared to other men my age. I was 26 years old, but my mind was that of a teenager. It is part of the reason I hung out with people like Johnny, who were much younger than me. It is also part of the reason I made the stupid plan to commit a robbery.

The worst of these decisions was the decision to commit a robbery with my friend,

Johnny Salazar. I am constantly overcome with guilt, shame and remorse over the pain that

decision caused. I will forever live with the pain I caused. Johnny was only fourteen years old;

he never got to live his life. He was a good friend to me, and I should never have agreed to take

him with me. I know I made a horrible mistake, and I take full responsibility for that. I hope to

one day be able to express my deepest apologies to the Salazar family for my part in Johnny's

death.

My time in prison has given me the opportunity to think about my mistakes. My incarceration has provided me with plenty of time for self-reflection. I have been able to really understand the impact my actions caused. Looking back at that day, nearly 20 years later, I wish more than anything I could go back and make different decisions. Different decisions would have changed the trajectory of my life. I wish I had sought treatment again. I wish I had turned to my many family members who wanted to help. I now realize how lucky I was to have people

who really loved me and would have continued to support me in my efforts to get my life back on track. I know I have no excuses for the mistakes I made.

However, I have become a better man throughout my time in prison. I have been continuously employed, taking every job I could possibly take. I also have consistently been enrolled in educational classes.³⁸ I have not had any fights, or engaged in any violent behavior, nor have I been placed in disciplinary segregation.³⁹ Most importantly, I have devoted my life to Christ, which has allowed me to be free from the bondages of addiction and crime.

I am a changed man since my arrest on October 4, 2002. My incarceration has given me the time to rehabilitate myself, and I want to start a new life, as the new man I have become. I hope to be able to get out of prison at an age that I can get married and have children. My sister, Yuri, is 38 years of age, happily married, and has 3 children of her own—identical twin girls and a boy. Their names are Valentina (6), Victoria (6) and Santiago (7). Yuri, and her husband, Neris, are co-partners in a very successful automotive business. They have found their opportunity to do well for themselves and are taking advantage of the "American Dream." My brother, Alex Naranjo, 44 years of age, works at a factory and is currently a manager. He has two children and is a wonderful father and companion to his children. He loves family life and has really grown into his responsibilities. I have maintained close relationships with my whole family, and their love has been unconditional.

I want to be a better son, brother, uncle, as well as a productive member of society. I want to return to my country of birth, to Mexico City. My cousin currently lives there, and I have

immediate employment awaiting me in Mexico City as an interpreter for my cousin's company. I will also be able to live with him. Additionally, my parents own a building in Mexico City, and they plan on moving there almost immediately to join me if I am released. I want to be there for them when they retire and care for them as they get older. I want to try to repay them for the love and support they have always given me. I fear that if I am required to serve my full sentence that I will not get that chance. My father is 70 and my mother is 68 years old. My father will be 92 and my mother will be 90 years old when I am to be released, if they are even still around.

VI. Reasons for Granting Clemency

A. Edgar's Conviction is Unjust When Considering the Outcome of the Salazar Family Wrongful Death Suit Against the City and New Facts of the Case Which Have Emerged Since Edgar's Conviction

Following Johnny Salazar's death, the Salazar family sued the City of Chicago in a wrongful death suit. On October 4, 2007, a jury awarded the Salazar family \$5,007,841, which was reduced to \$4,006,273 because the jury found Johnny to be 20% negligent in causing his own death.⁴⁰ In other words, the jury found that Officer Balbontin was 80% culpable in causing Salazar's death. The City ultimately settled with the Salazar family for \$2,250,000.⁴¹

The jury verdict against Balbontin should reduce Edgar's culpability for Johnny's death. However, none of the facts which cast blame on Balbontin were available for Edgar to use in his criminal case. In criminal cases under the felony murder rule, Balbontin's reckless conduct does not act as a supervening cause of Johnny's death nor is Edgar entitled to an affirmative defense of contributory negligence under the criminal law. The "proximate cause" theory of criminal

liability makes Edgar responsible for any foreseeable deaths that occur as a result of his participation in the home invasion. Because courts have held that police intervention is a foreseeable consequence of committing a forcible felony, and that accidental deaths are a foreseeable consequence of police intervention, it is often immaterial whether the police use of deadly force was not justified. Now, however, in the context of clemency, the relative faults of Edgar and Officer Balbontin for Johnny's death is a relevant and material consideration for this Board and the Governor in assessing whether Edgar's punishment of forty years is too extreme for his crime. This Board and the Governor are not bound by the limits placed on the definition of "proximate cause" in criminal cases; tort concepts of "proximate causation", including contributory negligence and intervening and supervening causes, can and should be used to assess Edgar's culpability.

In this context, Officer Balbontin's actions were so reckless that they became an intervening or supervening cause of Johnny's death. These actions could not have been foreseen by Edgar and Johnny, who were inside the Balbontin's home for a matter of seconds. As soon as they were met with resistance – simply being hit with a mop wringer – they abandoned their plan and ran out of the house. The robbery was over, and they were running away when Officer Balbontin fatally shot Johnny and wounded Edgar. They did not pose a danger to Officer Balbontin or anyone else. Officer Balbontin chased them and did not even pause before shooting after yelling "Chicago Police, freeze." He was so reckless in unloading his entire clip at the men that he even shot his own father.

Additionally, over the course of the civil suit, it became even more clear that Officer Balbontin did not need to shoot Johnny. In a special interrogatory, the jury was asked if Officer Balbontin reasonably believed that it was necessary to use deadly force to defend himself or others from death or great bodily harm – they answered "no."⁴³

B. Edgar's Forty-Year Sentence is Disproportionate to His Culpability Due to the Overbroad Application of the Outdated Felony Murder Law in Illinois at the Time of the Offense.

At the time of Edgar's arrest and conviction, Illinois adhered to the "proximate cause" theory of liability, holding felons responsible for any foreseeable deaths which occurred during the course of committing "forcible felonies", including the deaths of their co-felons at the hands of police officers. Illinois courts had held that police intervention in a forcible felony was a "foreseeable consequence" of the felony and that the deaths of co-felons which resulted from police shootings were also foreseeable. As a result, Edgar could be charged and convicted of felony-murder, even though he neither killed nor intended to kill Johnny. Of the states that have felony murder laws, the "proximate cause theory" is only applied in the minority of jurisdictions. 44 Most states apply the "agency theory" of liability, under which the felony murder law is only applied to killings committed by the felon him or herself, or an agent of the felon, such as an accomplice. 45

On February 22, 2021, Governor Pritzker signed the SAFE-T Act into law. 46 The SAFE-T Act includes a much-needed update to the felony murder law, bringing it into alignment with the majority of states. 47 The law now requires that in order for a defendant to be convicted of felony murder, the defendant or an accomplice must have caused the death. 48 Under the law today, it is likely that Edgar would not be charged with felony murder, let alone convicted of murder in connection with Johnny's death. Because this new law is not retroactive, however, the only way that Edgar can benefit from this new law is through a commutation of his sentence. The fact that Edgar's actions would no longer be sufficient to charge him with felony murder today is a critical consideration for this Board and the Governor and yet another reason why his sentence should be commuted to time served.

C. Edgar's Forty-Year Sentence is Disproportionate to His Culpability in Light of Recent Changes Which Clarify When and Under What Circumstances, Police May Use Deadly Force against Fleeing Felons

At the signing of the SAFE-T Act, Governor Pritzker said, "while there is more work to do, justice is being advanced once again today."⁴⁹ It is particularly true that there is more work to do around the people who are already incarcerated under the previous felony murder law, especially in cases in which a police officer shot and killed a co-felon fleeing a crime. In just the five years between 2011 and 2016, at least ten-people have been charged with felony murder in

shootings by police and sheriffs.⁵⁰ The SAFE-T Act makes significant progress here. Not only did the SAFE-T Act bring Illinois's felony murder law in line with most other states, but it also provided new guidance on the circumstances under which a police officer may use deadly force against fleeing felons. Now, a police officer must announce his office, provide a warning that deadly force will be used, and is *not allowed* to use deadly force against a fleeing suspect unless that suspect has just harmed or tried to harm another person, is in possession of a deadly weapon, is an active threat to human life, or would not be able to be apprehended safely at another date.⁵¹

None of these conditions were present to justify Officer Balbontin's use of deadly force against Salazar. At no point, did he provide any warning before firing a barrage of bullets at Edgar and Johnny while they were fleeing. He shot just after yelling "Chicago Police, freeze." At no point did he ask them to drop a weapon. Salajan, Balbontin never even saw a weapon; he never even saw the hands of Johnny or Edgar. Edgar and Johnny had not harmed or tried to harm anyone, they were not in possession of a deadly weapon, they were not an active threat to human life as they were simply running away, and there was no reason to think that they could not be apprehended safely at a later date. Indeed, Edgar was apprehended quickly after he turned up at a local hospital to get his gunshot wound treated.

It is not necessary for this this Board or the Governor to decide whether Officer

Balbontin was justified in using deadly force against Johnny Salazar and Edgar Naranjo in order

to determine that Edgar's forty-year sentence is too extreme for his crime. But the new facts which emerged in Salazar's successful civil suit and new laws which have been enacted concerning the felony murder law and police use of force, have cast the events of October 2002 in an entirely different light, a new light which suggests that Officer Balbontin bears much of the responsibility for Johnny's death and that Edgar is either not culpable or is less culpable. As a result of these changes, if Edgar were convicted today, he would likely be convicted only of home invasion – the underlying forcible felony – a crime which carries a sentence of between six and thirty years and which requires those convicted to serve at least 50% of their sentences. ⁵⁶ He has already served more time than he likely would have received for the home invasion conviction.

D. Edgar's Forty-Year Sentence is Disproportionate to his Culpability, Highlighted by Rafael Balbontin's Murder Conviction and Twenty-Five Year Sentence

Four years after the death of Johnny Salazar, and one year after the Salazar family's wrongful death suit, former Chicago police officer Balbontin found himself at the center of another tragedy. On January 19, 2005, Balbontin was out to dinner with his parents, when he told them he was going home to kill himself. Upon leaving the restaurant, his parents called his wife, warning her of his plans, and suggesting she hide all the guns in the home. However, when Balbontin arrived home, he ignited a domestic dispute with his wife. He fatally stabbed her over twenty times in the head, chest, and back. He even stabbed his mother-in-law in the arm when she tried to intervene. When the police responded to this horrific scene and approached the door

of his home, Balbontin simply said, "arrest me."⁵⁷ Balbontin was found guilty of first-degree murder and was sentenced to twenty-five years in prison for the intentional murder of his wife.⁵⁸

The difference between Edgar Naranjo's sentence of forty years in prison when Officer Balbontin, as an off-duty police officer, shot and killed his friend and wounded Edgar as they were running away from the Balbontin home, and Officer Balbontin's 25-year sentence for intentionally murdering his wife, highlights the unfairness of the felony murder rule. Balbontin is clearly more culpable in his wife's death than Edgar was in Johnny's death. Balbontin also committed a second crime, stabbing his mother-in-law when she tried to protect her daughter and his sentence does not reflect this additional harm. This disparity must be rectified. It is an affront to justice and yet another powerful reason for commuting Edgar's sentence. Providing Edgar with a commutation of sentence is necessary to ensure our criminal justice system doles out punishments that are proportional to the crime.

E. Edgar's Background, Education, Successful Work While Incarcerated, and Family Support Show That He Has Reformed and Will Be a Positive Influence in Society Upon Release

Edgar's demonstrated rehabilitation and commitment to his faith and helping others show that he will be a positive influence in his community upon release. While in prison, Edgar's disciplinary record, attached as Exhibit 11, has remained non-violent. Considering his background, Edgar is particularly unlikely to show any violence in the future.

Edgar has used his time in prison to better himself, continue his education, and maintain consistent employment to ensure his success upon release. He has taken multiple college courses, including writing skills and restorative justice classes, and has earned twenty-four credits toward his associate's degree. Edgar plans to complete the necessary credits for his associate's degree and his long-term employment goal is to become a mentor and motivational speaker. He wants to share his story of resilience and reformation to inspire others, particularly young people.

Edgar's faith has become a central part of his identity and everyday life. While incarcerated, he has devoted himself to Christ by reading the Bible every day, completing two religious studies programs through United Christian Bible Institute,⁵⁹ and engaging in regular self-reflective practices like journaling. His faith has helped him change into the man he is today and help him work through his past mistakes and regrets. Once released, Edgar plans to continue his relationship with Christ through reading the Bible, attending church when he settles in Mexico, and engaging with the religious community he hopes to find within the church.

Once released, Edgar will move to Puebla, Mexico, where he will work as an administrative assistant and an interpreter for his cousin's construction company. Edgar is bilingual in English and Spanish, and he is excited at the opportunity to use his communication skills to further his career. Edgar's cousin, Gustavo, will provide him with this employment and with a place to live.⁶⁰

In addition to his spiritual and employment goals, Edgar is focused on his commitment to his family and supporting them in the future. Throughout his incarceration, Edgar has maintained

weekly phone calls with his parents and sister, and monthly phone calls with his brother. Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, his family visited him once a month, and they will continue to visit as soon as it is safe to do so. Edgar spends a lot of time thinking about his family and often writes them letters when he does so. His parents have stood by him through everything and loved him unconditionally. They are prepared to support him in any way necessary upon his release and also plan to move to Mexico upon Edgar's release. Edgar looks forward to having the opportunity to live close to them and support them as they get older. These close family relationships will provide Edgar with the support he needs to successfully re-enter society. Officials in the protection department of the Mexican consulate have met with Edgar in the past, and have committed to assisting his return to Mexico, if he is granted elemency.⁶¹

VII. Conclusion

Edgar Naranjo did not kill or intend to kill anyone when he and fourteen-year old Johnny Salazar pushed their way into the home of Juan and Juana Balbontin in October 2002. He accepts full responsibility for his actions on that day and the terror that he caused the Balbontins and feels deeply, morally responsible for bringing Johnny with him and setting in motion the events that would lead to Johnny's death. But Edgar could not have foreseen the reckless actions of Officer Balbontin. Edgar and Johnny thought they were going to rob an older man, who Edgar was familiar with from the flea market, of bottles of cologne. Edgar and Johnny took precautions to prevent violence by bringing only an unloaded BB gun with them. Their purpose was simply to intimidate the Balbontins into giving them the cologne – they had no intention for anyone to be harmed. They abandoned their crime and fled the scene once the Balbontins gave resistance. They were completely unaware that they were entering a home where a Chicago police officer

lived or that he would open fire on them as they were fleeing. For these actions, Edgar was guilty of the forcible felony of home invasion.⁶² He has already served over eighteen-years in prison, which is likely more time than he would have served if given a sentence within the appropriate range for home invasion.⁶³

We ask that the Board and the Governor consider how the felony murder law and the rules for the use of deadly force against fleeing felons have changed, the many inconsistencies in the police department's version of events and the new facts which have emerged which raise questions about whether Officer Balbontin was justified in shooting Johnny Salazar, and the jury's verdict against Officer Balbontin and the City of Chicago in the Salazar family's wrongful death lawsuit. We ask that this Board and Governor view Edgar's crimes through the same lens that society is now viewing police-involved shootings in this period of racial reckoning and in the aftermath of the killing of Laquan McDonald, George Floyd, Breanna Taylor, and most recently Adam Toledo. Viewing Edgar's crime in this current context, we submit that Edgar's sentence does not match his culpability.

Edgar has already been over-punished for his participation in the home invasion; his eighteen-plus years served is more than the amount of time he likely would have received for the home invasion. Edgar has changed his life during his incarceration and rehabilitated himself. He has deeply reconnected to his Christian faith, he no longer uses drugs, and he has a large support network of family and friends who have agreed to welcome him back with open arms and to

assist him with his emotional and financial needs. Commuting Edgar's sentence to time served would allow Edgar to get a fresh start, not on the streets of Chicago, but in his home country of Mexico where a job and family await and where he has spent time before as an adult. Even the Mexican Consulate, which has assisted Edgar and his family since he was arrested, has agreed to continue to work with Edgar until he is safely resettled in Mexico. ⁶⁴

Edgar's forty-year sentence does not fit Edgar's crime. He has exhausted all of his legal options to obtain a new sentence through the courts. For all the reasons outlined in this petition, we respectfully ask that the Board temper justice with mercy and tailor Edgar's sentence to more suitably fit his crime. We ask that the Board recommend that his sentence be commuted and that the Governor commute Edgar Naranjo's sentence to time-served.

Charged with murder, but they didn't kill anyone—police did

A *Reader* investigation found ten cases since 2011 where police killed a civilian in Chicago and charged an accomplice with the murder.

n July 8, 2012, as the summer sun rose over the Auburn Gresham neighborhood on the south side of Chicago, police hauled a distraught 19-year-old named Tevin Louis away from a murder scene. The victim was Louis's best friend, Marquise Sampson. The shooter was a veteran police officer, Antonio Dicarlo.

For the previous five years, Louis and Sampson had been inseparable, drawn together by rough childhoods marked by foster care and poverty. In good times, Sampson made Louis laugh. In hard times, Louis made sure Sampson had food and a place to stay. As the boys became young men, they began to work the streets together, as they did everything, for better and for worse.

The day Sampson died, the pair had allegedly robbed a local gyros shop of approximately \$1,250. Louis then ran from the restaurant. Sampson soon followed, then crossed paths with police.

After spotting Sampson running, Dicarlo and his partner gave chase, according to the Chicago Police Department's case report, pursuing the teen for a quarter mile as he ran to the block where he often stayed with Louis and his cousin. But Louis never saw his friend alive again.

County Medical Examiner's autopsy report. Louis attempted to cross the police line to be at his friend's side. He was promptly arrested for disorderly conduct and has been locked up ever since.

"Marquise was like a brother—like he came from my momma's womb," Louis told the *Reader* by phone from Lawrence Correctional Center in southern Illinois. "It was heartbreaking. I lost somebody I be with every day."

In a statement given to the Independent Police Review Authority, the agency that investigates police shootings and allegations of misconduct, Dicarlo described in detail the lead-up to Sampson's death, claiming the teen had pointed a weapon in his direction, prompting him to fire. That Dicarlo fatally shot Sampson is also acknowledged in Chicago Police Department reports.

Yet it's Louis whom the Cook County criminal justice system has held responsible. Following Louis's initial arrest, the charge of disorderly conduct evolved to include robbery and first-degree murder. In the subsequent months, he was found guilty of each.

Under a controversial legal doctrine known as the "felony murder rule," the teen's prosecution relied on a theory of accountability enshrined in Illinois's criminal code: that while committing a felony, a person can set in motion a chain of events that lead to the death of another person.

"I cried," Louis admitted, remembering the moment he learned that he was being charged with murder for his friend's death. "It was unreal. I didn't know what was happening."

But Louis's prosecution was no fluke. Rather, a *Reader* investigation finds that his case was one of at least ten in Cook County in the past five years in which killings by Chicago Police Department and Cook County sheriff's officers have resulted in felony murder charges for civilians. In particular, the *Reader* found three cases in which police fatally shot passengers in fleeing vehicles—an act that's come under intense scrutiny since the fatal shooting of 18-year-old Paul O'Neal in late July—before holding a surviving passenger responsible.

Although these prosecutions are sanctioned by Illinois law, these cases raise difficult questions about the law's use and impact—especially when felony murder charges stem from situations involving possible police misconduct.

At trial, Louis refused a plea deal on the murder charge. Presiding judge Jorge Alonso instructed the jury to consider Louis's murder and robbery charges as interdependent, explaining that under the

The jury found Louis guilty. He's now serving a 32-year sentence for armed robbery and an additional 20-year sentence for Sampson's death. He's also appealing his case.

"I'm not perfect," he says. "But I don't deserve this."

While in prison, he had "Marquise 7-8-12" tattooed on one hand, and his best friend's birthday on the other.

And while Louis is serving time for his friend's murder, the officer who actually pulled the trigger has been commended for his actions. For fatally shooting Sampson, Dicarlo received a 2013 Superintendent's Award for Valor, which honors "an act of outstanding bravery or heroism," according to CPD. Mayor Rahm Emanuel presided over the ceremony.

Interview requests. In a statement, Guglielmi said that "when wrong doing [sic] or intentional misconduct is discovered, CPD holds individuals accountable," and that the department's "commitment to the highest levels of integrity and the highest levels of professional standards is unwavering." Attempts to interview the individual officers named in this story, including Dicarlo, made through requests sent to personal e-mail addresses, phone numbers, and via CPD and the Fraternal Order of Police (the police union), yielded no response from the officers. The FOP didn't respond to other requests for comment, nor did the Cook County Sheriff's Office.

Based on Dicarlo's account, IPRA found the shooting of Sampson justified in February 2014, as it has in nearly all of the 238 closed shooting investigations detailed on the organization's website. In dashcam video obtained by the *Reader* via a Freedom of Information Act request, Dicarlo's encounter with Sampson is obscured, visible only through the windshields of a car parked between Dicarlo's police vehicle and the officer and suspect. Their interaction lasts just a few seconds before Sampson appears to collapse.

Dicarlo's 15-year career with CPD has been marred by at least 21 misconduct complaints, including four excessive force complaints, one of which alleged improper use of a weapon, according to documents obtained via FOIA request and from the Citizens Police Data Project. Misconduct complaints also accuse Dicarlo of conduct unbecoming an officer, unnecessary physical contact, illegal search, illegal arrest, and five separate instances of failure to provide service.

The city has settled at least two civil lawsuits against Dicarlo—for a total of \$55,000—including one that alleged the officer had beaten a man so badly he was left bleeding from the head, that he then tried to convince fellow officers to forgo calling an ambulance, and then lied to a health-care provider about the cause of the man's injuries.

For his part, Louis doesn't believe his friend would have pulled his weapon on police.

"There's a difference between doing something wrong and just being fucking stupid," Louis says. "Marquise wasn't stupid. I think [Dicarlo] murdered him in cold blood."

THE FELONY MURDER RULE has its roots in English common law, under which all felonies were punishable by death, and any participant in a violent crime could be liable for a killing by an accomplice. Starting in the 19th century, most American states enacted laws imposing murder liability for killing in the course of the

to cases in which one of the accused fatally attacked a victim with a weapon.

Today, almost every state has some form of felony murder liability. The laws vary as to which felonies can give rise to murder charges and how directly the arrestee must be involved in the death in order to be charged. Many felony murder laws—including those in California, Pennsylvania, and Maryland—contain a separate rule that requires the killer to be a participant or "agent" in the felony. Other states, such as New York and Kansas, have a "protected person" rule that prevents an arrestee from being liable for the death of a coarrestee.

But in Illinois and other states, the felony murder rule features an even more controversial component: If death is a foreseeable result of the crime, then a participant in the felony can be liable for any death—even if the bullets were fired by the police, and even if the victim is the accused's partner.

Guyora Binder, a professor at the University at Buffalo Law School and the author of a scholarly book on felony murder, sees charges filed under these circumstances as a red flag for police misconduct.

"A felony murder charge for an arrestee where a police officer has killed somebody is an indicator that the police officer probably engaged in misconduct," Binder says, explaining that in situations where police have behaved irresponsibly and caused death, prosecutors will often turn around and charge an arrestee with the killing.

But in a statement, the Cook County state's attorney's office said that the way it applies the felony murder law is legally appropriate and justified, adding that it "does not base felony murder charges against a defendant charged with murder . . . upon irresponsible

Still, because Illinois law lacks either an "agent of the defense" or "protected person" rule, there are fewer hurdles to charging arrestees with felony murder after a police shooting.

As a result, "you get a surprising number of cases of police-inflicted death for felony murder in Illinois," Binder says.

AMONG THE TEN recent felony murder cases studied by the *Reader*, three stem from police officers firing at fleeing vehicles in apparent violation of the department's "deadly force" policy, which since February 2015 has forbidden the practice. In another case, charges stemmed from police crashing into the car of a bystander during a chase.

In August 2015 Rafael Cruz Jr. died from a single gunshot wound to the back. At the time he was driving a car away from police commander Francis Valadez and another officer, who both fired on his vehicle. Officers claimed that Cruz and his companion, Erik Martinez, had been exchanging gunfire with another car immediately prior—an alleged felony that later allowed prosecutors to charge that Martinez had set in motion a chain of events that led to Valadez and the second officer killing Cruz. Martinez has been locked up in Cook County Jail awaiting trial since the incident. Valadez pulled the trigger in three previous fatal civilian shootings, according to city documents.

In April 2012, John Givens and Leland Dudley, both 37 years old, each sustained multiple gunshot wounds while attempting to flee Chicago police officers following a robbery. According to court records, the officers shot "30 to 40 bullets" in total at the car, while both Givens and Leland were unarmed. Afterward, they were convicted on felony murder charges for the death of a third companion, David Strong, and are currently serving 20– and 25–year sentences respectively.

And in the 2013 case of 23-year-old Timothy Jones, a felony murder charge came after police in his pursuit fatally crashed into a car belonging to an innocent bystander, 56-year-old Jacqueline Reynolds.

According to the *Chicago Tribune*, at Jones's trial, a close friend of Reynolds's asked for mercy on his behalf. Reynolds's family refused to submit victim impact statements, which are typically used to evoke a harsher sentence from the judge. Still, Jones was found guilty and is required to serve the corresponding 28-year sentence in full.

"I think of Jacqueline Reynolds everyday," he added, "cause not only was her life lost that day, but mine was too."

cnases that have resulted in death or injury since 2013-including the crash that killed Reynolds-had been reviewed by the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board, the state agency that investigates fatal police chases. The investigation implies that while the board reviews the cases it receives, it receives few reports. NBC 5 found that the organization never received a report on Reynolds's death from CPD.

Asked to explain how the actions of officers who embark on fatal police chases are reviewed within the department—if they are not being investigated by an outside agency—CPD's Guglielmi said the department has a traffic-pursuit review committee that "meets regularly to thoroughly review traffic pursuits," but he was not able to share the committee's finding regarding the pursuit that led to Reynold's death or the number of cases that have resulted in discipline since 2013.

FOR TRISTAN SCAGGS, the incident started with a police pursuit and ended with scores of bullets. In November 2006, 19-year-old Scaggs woke up in pain, shackled to a hospital bed, and surrounded by Cook County Sheriff's deputies.

"You must be somebody," he remembers a nurse remarking.

(Although Scaggs's case took place prior to the years the *Reader* examined in detail, the particulars of the case seemed to warrant further scrutiny.)

Slowly, Scaggs remembered how he'd gotten there: On October 30 he and two friends had been driving in Humboldt Park in a stolen Pontiac Grand Prix. Police followed them for many blocks, then curbed and surrounded the car, firing into it more than 60 times, according to state appellate court records.

Officers shot his friend William Tyler, the driver of the car, at least 24 times, according to ballistics reports from the medical examiner's office. They also shot a passenger, his friend Marcus Thomas, at least six times, according to reports. Both young men died.

Scaggs also took a shot—in the back.

As he slowly came to at the hospital, a deputy informed him that he had been charged with his friends' murders—along with several other charges, including attempted murder and conspiracy to commit murder.

"At first I thought it was a lie," Scaggs said in a recent phone interview from Stateville Correctional Center. "I thought to be

During the initial investigation, hospital staff kept Scaggs's family members at a distance, according to his aunt, Shirley Carter. Scaggs was listed under an alias at the hospital, making it hard to track him, Carter recalls. She was the first person to see him because Scaggs's mother is deaf and cannot speak.

"It was crazy to me to hear that [he had been shot] and to try to explain to my sister what had happened," Carter says. "It was like, 'Oh my god, is my nephew going to make it?'"

Scaggs is now serving a 38-year-sentence. In a recent conversation, he recalled the traumatic encounter that put him in the hospital and then in prison.

After seeing Tyler get shot in the head, Scaggs says he raised his hands and exited the car, crawling on the ground. He could see one

"Officer Bocardo was standing there with an assault rifle, and then he shot me in the back," Scaggs wrote in an 2013 affidavit. "I felt it down in my hip. I was rocking back and forth trying to breath [sic]. I said, 'Why the fuck did you shoot me.' He said, 'Because you are fixing to die mother-fucker.'"

Bocardo—a CPD sergeant—has ten known misconduct complaints against him, according to the Citizens Police Data Project. Half of those complaints are for use-of-force allegations, for which Bocardo has received no discipline, according to city data. None of the complaints were sustained in favor of the citizens' account of events. Rather, the department has commended Bocardo dozens of times, with honors such as the Life Saving Award the year after he shot Scaggs and the Superintendent's Award of Valor.

Within days of Scaggs's shooting, CPD issued a press release describing the scene as a fatal shoot-out in which officers had foiled a murder plot by members of the New Breed street gang.

Scaggs says he was never a New Breed gang member, although he admits to being friends with some of the gang's members and holding weapons for them for a couple of bucks. As a young teen, he had been part of the Four Corner Hustlers, he says, but his ties dwindled as he grew older, became more interested in school, and fostered career ambitions of working as an EMT.

CPD's press release stated that the young men in the car "brandished weapons."

But the shell casings found at the scene all came from police weapons, and officers had fired at least 69 times from at least ten different guns, according to uncontested forensic evidence presented at trial. omcers gave statements supporting Scaggs's account, but these officers were never called to testify at his trial—a fact highlighted in Scaggs's appeal, along with his assertion that CPD allowed the Grand Prix to be salvaged after the defense filed a motion to inspect the car.

While Scaggs was ultimately found not guilty of killing his friends, a jury convicted him of attempted first-degree murder of a police officer and conspiracy to commit murder.

"I know I didn't do nothing. I shouldn't have been in that situation," Scaggs said. "I'm locked up for something I didn't do."

Scaggs's words echo Jones's: "I don't feel I should serve 28 years of my life for a car accident that I was not involved in," wrote Jones, who had a scholarship to play football at Lincoln University in Jefferson City, Missouri. "I feel as if I wasn't given a second chance, seeing that I was actually on a path that was leading me somewhere. . . . I feel as if the police could have told the truth at my trial, and I would have been found not guilty. I feel the judge could have done more to help too. But the system was built to destroy."

For others convicted of felony murder, like Tevin Louis, the road ahead is their focus.

"Right now, I'm just living to go home," he says. "I want what every other human being wants: have some kids, make a family, do the small things that matter the most. I'm still living. I'm alive." **G**

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



Shooting by officer justified, police say; Cops believe body may be intruder's

An off-duty Chicago police officer who shot at two people after they allegedly forced their way into his Far Northwest Side home and pointed a gun at his mother was justified in firing his gun, police said Saturday.

"His actions were heroic," said Pat Camden, Chicago police spokesman.

Police were trying to determine Saturday whether a body found on the Southwest Side was that of one of the intruders, a 14-year-old boy who was shot in the chest. Camden said police believe it is his body.

The other person accused of breaking into the home, a 26-year-old man, was in fair condition Saturday in Cook County Hospital with a gunshot wound to his hand.

Officer Rafael Balbontin, 30, who has been on the police force 10 months, accidentally shot his father in the shoulder during the confrontation.

About 10 a.m. Friday, two people knocked on the door of the home in the 3000 block of North New England Avenue, where Balbontin lives with his parents and sister. When Balbontin's mother answered the door, the two allegedly forced their way inside, dragging her down the hallway with a gun to her forehead.

"She started yelling, and they kept telling her to shut up," said the officer's sister, Jeanette Balbontin, 18.

Rafael Balbontin, who police said was in the basement, heard his mother's shouts, ran upstairs for his handgun, and chased the two intruders out the front door. The two had guns but did not fire them before Balbontin shot at them in the front yard, Camden said.

One bullet grazed the shoulder of the officer's father. He was in fair condition Saturday in Illinois Masonic Medical Center, a hospital spokeswoman said.

The suspects left in a car. Police declined to say how they determined their identities. Both have criminal records, police said.

A pedestrian found a body about 2 p.m. Friday in the 4400 block of West 45th Street.

The Cook County medical examiner's office has not identified the body, a spokesman said Saturday.

A police panel Friday found that Balbontin acted "in fear of his life," and the shooting was justified, Camden said.

Neighbors on the quiet street expressed surprise at the attempted burglary.

"I had a break-in years and years ago, but overall this is a safe neighborhood. I feel safe walking my dog at 10 at night," said Nancy Nolan, who has lived across the street from the Balbontins' home for 24 years.

Salazar died, and Naranjo later told police that he dumped his body in an industrial area in the 4400 block of West 45th Street, police said.



To Governor J.B. Pritzker and Members of the Illinois Prisoner Review Board:

This letter is in regards to the petition for executive clemency that has been filed in the case of Edgar Naranjo, a Mexican national incarcerated in the state of Illinois. The participation of the Consulate in this part of the process is one of the many activities undertaken by this office to provide consular protection and assistance to Mexican nationals in the State of Illinois.

Under international law, the Consulate General of Mexico has a responsibility to assist Mexican nationals abroad. We act pursuant to customary International Law, the Consular Convention Between the United States of America and the United Mexican States, 57 Stat. 800; Treaty Series 985 (Article VI), and the Vienna Convention on Consular Relations, 21 U.S.T. 77, T.I.A.S. No. 6820 (Articles 5, 36 and 37).

The Government of Mexico through this Consulate General has provided consular assistance to Edgar Naranjo and his family since the year 2004, throughout his incarceration at the Illinois Department of Corrections.

As the Consulate General of Mexico recognizes the criminal process and consequences of Mr. Naranjo's actions, the purpose of this letter is to assist Mr. Naranjo in his request for a commutation of his sentence to time-served. It has been pointed out by Mr. Naranjo's attorneys that his forty-year sentence is disproportionate to his culpability for the death of his friend and accomplice Johnny Salazar, especially after Illinois has recently enacted changes to the felony murder statute aimed at reining in the scope of the law that convicted Mr. Naranjo.

Mr. Naranjo has expressed his desire to return to Mexico, where he has family that will help him to reintegrate into society. If the executive clemency is granted, the Consulate General of Mexico will be able to provide Mr. Naranjo with financial assistance for his safe return to Mexico and with a travel document (passport) to enter the country.

INVESTIGATION: The R/Ds were assigned to this investigation by Sgt. E. MINGEY of Area Five. The R/Ds proceeded to the location of 3013 N. New England. Living at this address are Juan and Juana BALBONTIN, their son Rafael BALBONTIN (an off duty police officer assigned to the 15th district) and his wife, and a daughter who was not at home at the time. New England is a residential street consisting of single family residences. The house at 3013 N. New England was secured with yellow crime scene tape. Eight 45 call shell casings were recovered from the front of the house. A fired bullet was recovered from a green shed at 2955 N. New England and one fired bullet was recovered from the siding of 2951 N. New England. A canvass of the area was done by assisting detective units.

As you enter the house at 3013 N. New England, you step into a foyer. From the foyer you can enter a hallway that leads towards the rear of the house past the bathroom to an area that leads to the bedroom of Juan and Juana: BALBONTIN, the kitchen and the basement stairs. From the foyer you can also enter the living room which also leads to the above mentioned area.

The R/Ds then interviewed P.O. BALBONTIN. The following is a summation of this interview.

P.O. Rafael BALBONTIN

P.O. BALBONTIN stated that he was at home at 3013 N. New England in his bedroom which is located in the basement. On 4 Oct. 02 at a little after 1000 Hrs. he said that he heard two knocks on the door and then heard the door open. He heard a loud commotion and his mother screaming from the first floor. P.O. BALBONTIN said that he grabbed his gun which was in a holster and ran upstairs. P.O. BALBONTIN said that he followed his father Juan BALBONTIN up the stairs and yelled out Chicago Police. When he got to the first floor he observed two males wearing yellow raincoats flee out the front door. He said that his mother Juana yelled out in Spanish that the two had guns. P.O. BALBONTIN followed them out the front door. After he exited the house, one of the persons in the yellow raincoat began to turn in his direction. P.O. BALBONTIN said that he fired at the two. He again announced his office and again fired at the two. P.O. BALBONTIN said that at this time he father stepped in front of him as he was firing his weapon and that he struck his father in the right shoulder. P.O. BALBONTIN then went to the aid of his father and did not pursue the two persons in the yellow raincoats. He told his mother to call the police and stayed with his father.

The R/Ds then interviewed Juana BALBONTIN with the assistance of P.O. C. NUNEZ. The following is a summation of that interview.

Juana BALBONTIN

She stated that she was at home when she heard knocking on her front door. She said that she went to the front door and looked out the door window. Ms. BALBONTIN said that she observed a person who was wearing

a yellow raincoat bending down. When she opened the door, the person in the yellow raincoat pushed the door open and pushed her down the hallway. She then observed a second person, who is also in a yellow raincoat, enter the hallway holding a gun. She said that the first person told her not to make any noise while he was holding a finger up to his lips. At this point she began to scream. She said that she can not remember what she was saying as she was afraid of the gun. Ms. BALBONTIN then related that she heard a "Popping Noise" that she believes came from the gun the second person was holding.

Ms. BALBONTIN said that she then heard someone running up the stairs from the basement. She saw her husband enter the hallway from the living room by the front door. Ms. BALBONTIN said that she observed her husband swing a mop ringer at one of the offenders and possibly striking him in the back. Ms. BALBONTIN stated that the two offenders then fled out the front door and that her husband followed them. Ms. BALBONTIN could not recall seeing her son Rafael run out the door.

Ms BALBONTIN then heard load bangs coming from outside the house. She said that these noises were louder than the popping noise she heard inside. She then looked out the door and observed her husband on the ground with Rafael by him.

She could add nothing further at this time.

Bt.#9602 then arrived and processed the scene recovering P.O. BALBONTIN weapon, the shell casings in front of the house, and the two fired bullets from the buildings on the 2900 block of New England.

The R/Ds then proceeded into Area Five and interviewed two witnesses from New England that had been transported into the Area.

First the R/Ds interviewed Frank KEWAN. The following is a summation of this interview.

Frank KIWAN

KIWAN said that he is a tow truck driver and that he was hooking up a car

at 2955 N. New England when he heard two shots coming from the 3000-block of New England. He stated that he looked up and observed two males wearing yellow raincoats running southbound on the 3000 block of New England. KJWAN observed one the individuals fall to the ground. This person then got up and ran around the corner. He then heard numerous other shots. He said that he did not see who was shooting. KIWAN said that when he arrived on the block to tow the car, he observed a blue older model Chev. Caprice parked in the alley behind 3001 N. New England. When the shooting started, He said that the Chev. drove into the alley behind his customer's house and continue southward. He did not know if the Chev, had any involvement. in the shooting. KTWAN said that he would be unable to identify the offenders in this incident. He could add nothing further.

The R/Ds then interviewed Peggy RIORDAN who lives at 2958 N. New Castle. The following is summation of this interview.

Ms. RIORDAN said that she was working in her computer room when she heard what she thought were two shots. She stated that she looked out the window but did not see anything unusual. She then went to the back door and looked out the window. She said that she observe a person laying in the parkway at approximately 6844 W. Wellington. She said that this person was wearing a yellow rain coat. She said that the head was to the north and the legs were to the south with the feet hanging in the street. It was during this time that a check of made of area hospitals to determine if any had a gunshot wound of a suspicious nature. The R/Ds were informed that a Edgar NARANJO had came into Cook County Hospital complaining of a gunshot wound in his hand from 3957 W. 31st Street and recorded under RD#HH651-630. Det. I. ALANIS and Det. G. RODRIGUEZ responded to Cook County Hospital and interviewed NARANJO. This is a subject of an additional supplementary report.

At Approximately 2100 Hrs. the R/DS were notified that NARANJO had confessed to Dets. ALANIS and RODRIGUEZ to committing the home invasion at 3013 N. New England. A short time later Det. D. DEJA #20127 found the offender's vehicle the vicinity of Hoyne and Damen.

NARANJO further related that he knew Juan BALBONTIN from the flee market where BALBONTIN sold colognes and watches.

NARANJO said that for about the past week He and SALAZAR talked about doing a home invasion of BALBONTIN and stealing some of the colognes and sell them at flee markets.

NARANJO called SALAZAR on 3 Oct. 02 and the two decided to do the home invasion on 4 Oct. 02.

On 4 Oct. NARANJO borrowed his cousin Francisco HERNANDEZ's car between 0830 and 0900 Hrs. and went and picked up SALAZAR. The two then drove to a Seven Eleven convenience located between Narragansett and Oak Park Aves. on Belmont Ave. From here he called BALBONTIN in order to make sure he

was home. After talking with BALBONTIN, the two drove over to the area of BALBONTIN's house and parked their auto on New Castle north of Wellington. The two exited the vehicle and put on the yellow rain slickers. I NARANIO said that he noticed a man walking his dog at this time.

The two then walked over to BALBONTIN's house and knocked on the door. NARANJO related that SALAZAR was armed with a pellet gum. NARANJO said that BALBONTIN's wife answered the door. When she opened the door, NARANJO pushed open the door and pushed her down the hallway. He said that he was telling her to be quiet. NARANJO said she began to scream. At this point he heard someone running up the stairs. NARANJO said that he was then struck in the back by Juan BALBONTIN with an object. After hearing whizzing going by his head, NARANJO said that he fled out the door followed by SALAZAR.

As he was fleeing her heard numerous gunshots. When he reached his auto, he realized that SALAZAR had fallen on Wellington. He then backed up his auto where he assisted SALAZAR into the auto and then they drove off. When he turned eastbound onto the Eisenhower from Central, He dropped the gun out the window onto the pavement. He then dropped SALAZAR off at 47th and Kolin. He said that SALAZAR then walked away to meet up with his friends. He said that he did not see SALAZAR again.

NARANJO said that he then drove to Cook County Hospital for treatment of the gunshot wound he received during the home invasion. NARANJO said that he was unsure if SALAZAR was shot. When questioned about his auto, NARANJO could not explained on why he parked his auto away from the hospital.

At this point the R/Ds informed NARANJO that they had a witness who said that he helped SALAZAR into the auto. NARANJO then said that SALAZAR was on his knees and that he helped him into the auto. He further said that when SALAZAR exited the auto, he sat on the curb and told NARANJO to go on and that he 'SALAZAR' would be okay.

The R/Ds then told NARANJO that the witness stated that SALAZAR did not get into the auto on his own out that NARANJO had put him into the back seat. At this time NARANJO said that he wanted to tell the truth.

NARANJO said SALAZAR was laying in the parkway when he backed up the auto. He said that SALAZAR pad been shot and was hurt bad. He said that he then drove to the 45th Street by Kilbourn and put SALAZAR on he curb. SALAZAR told NARANJO that he was okay and that he did not want to go to the hospital. Upon further questioning. NARANJO said that he believed that SALAZAR was dead why he put him on the curb on 45th Street. He further stated that SALAZAR was not conscious on Wellington and that it was possible that he was dead at that time.

At this time the R/Ds contacted Lt. KEANE and informed him of the content of NARANJO'S interview. As the R/Ds were leaving Cook County Hospital, they were contacted by Sgt. ARGENTINO who informed the R/Ds that body of Juan SALAZAR who resided at 4822 S. Karlov was discovered at 4455 W. 45th Street earlier on 4 Oct. 02. The R/Ds went to this location to observe the scene. They then went to 4822 S. Karlov and met with SALAZAR'S mother, Laura SALAZAR.

The R/Ds were then contacted by Det. ALANIS who stated that NARANJO told him that he

He went on to say that Johnny OROZCO, 14 yrs old, got off at 47th and Knox he got off there because he hungs with his buddles there. He stated that Johnny lives at 4822 S. Karlov. He stated that he has been living with Johnny since his father threw him out of the family home a few weeks ago.

He then went to say that he and Johnny knocked on the door and a lady opened the door and that her husband and someone else confronted them.

He stated that he met Juan BALBONTIN from New England a few years ago, that Juan gave him his business card with his name and address on it (3013 N. New England) and that he sold colognes at the Canal street fleat market.

He stated that he was the one who thought about going over to Juan's house to rob him because he didn't have any money and he has been having a hard time ever since his father threw him out.

He stated that he went to his cousin Pancho's on his bike to borrow his car. Then he headed south Karlov to pick up Johnny. Johnny had a Black with brown handle BB-GUN-unloaded.

They then straight to New England, parked around the corner and then they both walked up to the house and knocked. A lady answered and they pushed in, Juan her husband then came up and hit him on the head with something and then someone else came up from the basement and started firing at them. They then run out of the house, and he then felt a pain to his hand, and then Johnny fell and he helped him into the backseat of the car. Then he drove south - got on the expressway- he threw, the gun out of the driver side window and then dropped Johnny off and then he drove to Cook County Hospital.

That he pushed in and didn't say anything- he had on a yellow raincoat (poncho) he had a skull cap on blue in tolor it's like a knit type, and he also had on a black lower face mask, black leather fingerless gloves which he hrew out after he throw the gun out. He threw out all of these items as he was going threw the alleys after letting lohnny out on Knox.

P.O. BALBONTIN stated that he was at home at 3013 N. New England in his bedroom which is located in the basement. On 4 Oct. 02 at a little after 1000 Hrs. he said that he heard two knocks on the door and then heard the door open. He heard a loud commotion and his mother screaming from the first floor. P.O. BALBONTIN said that he grabbed his gun which was in a holster and ran upstairs. P.O. BALBONTIN said that he followed his father Juan BALBONTIN up the stairs and yelled out Chicago Police. When he got to the first floor he observed two males wearing yellow raincoats flee out the front door. He said that his mother Juana yelled out in Spanish that the two had guns. P.O. BALBONTIN followed them out the front door. After he exited the house, one of the persons in the yellow raincoat began to turn in his direction. P.O. BALBONTIN said that he fired at the two. He again announced his office and again fired at the two. P.O. BALBONTIN said that at this time he father stepped in front of him as he was firing his weapon and that he struck his father in the right shoulder. P.O. BALBONTIN then went to the aid of his father and did not pursue the two persons in the yellow raincoats. He told his mother to call the police and stayed with his father.

The R/Ds then interviewed Juana BALBONTIN with the assistance of P.O. C. NUNEZ. The following is a summation of that interview.

Juana BALBONTIN

She stated that she was at home when she heard knocking on her front door. She said that she went to the front door and looked out the door window. Ms. BALBONTIN said that she observed a person who was wearing a yellow raincoat bending down. When she opened the door, the person in the yellow raincoat pushed the door open and pushed her down the hallway. She then observed a second person, who is also in a yellow raincoat, enter the hallway holding a gun. She said that the first person told her not to make any noise while he was, holding a finger up to his lips. At this point she began to scream. She said that she can not remember what she was saying as she was afraid of the gun. Ms. BALBONTIN then related that she heard a "Popping Noise" that she believes came from the gun the second person was holding.

Ms. BALBONTIN said that she then heard someone running up the stairs from the basement. She saw her husband enter the hallway from the living room by the front door. Ms. BALBONTIN said that she observed her husband swing a mop ringer at one of the offenders and possibly striking him in the back. Ms. BALBONTIN stated that the two offenders then fled out the front door and that her husband followed them. Ms. BALBONTIN could not recall seeing her son Rafael run out the door.

Ms BALBONTIN then heard load bangs coming from outside the house. She said that these noises were louder than the popping noise she heard inside. She then looked out the door and observed her husband on the ground with Rafael by him.

She could add nothing further at this time.

Bt.#9602 then arrived and processed the scene recovering P.O. BALBONTIN weapon, the shell easings in front of the house, and the two fired bullets from the buildings on the 2900 block of New England.

First the R/Ds interviewed Frank KEWAN. The following is a summation of this interview.

Frank KIWAN

KIWAN said that he is a tow truck driver and that he was hooking up a car.

at 2955 N. New England when he heard two shots coming from the 3000 block of New England. He stated that he looked up and observed two males wearing yellow raincoats running southbound on the 3000 block of New England. KIWAN observed one the individuals fall to the ground. This person then got up and ran around the corner. He then heard numerous other shots. He said that he did not see who was shooting. It during this time, he began to run into his customer's house and told her to call the police. He did not come out until he observed the police arrive.

When the shooting started, He said that the Chev. drove into the alley behind his customer's house and continue southward. He did not know if the Chev. had any involvement in the shooting. KIWAN said that he would be unable to identify the offenders in this incident. He could add nothing further.

The R/Ds then interviewed Peggy RIORDAN who lives at 2958 N. New Castle. The following is a summation of this interview.

Peggy RIORDAN

Ms. RIORDAN said that she was working in her computer room when she heard what she thought were two shots. She stated that she looked out the window but did not see anything unusual. She then went to the back door and looked out the window. She said that she observe a person laying in the parkway at approximately 6844 W. Wellington. She said that this person was wearing a yellow rain coat. She said that the head was to the north and the legs were to the south with the feet hanging in the street. After advising NARANJO of his rights from the FOP handbook, and NARANJO stating that he understood these rights. NARANJO agreed to talk with the R/Ds. The following is a summation of this interview.

Edgar NARANJO

NARANJO stated that he wished to tell the truth because he was concern about Johnny OROSCO kna Juan; SALAZAR. NARANJO said that he was kicked out of his parent's house approximately two weeks earlier and that he moved in with Johnny SALAZAR at 4822 S. Karlov. NARANJO further related that he knew Juan BALBONTIN from the flee market where BALBONTIN sold colognes and watches.

NARANJO said that for about the past week He and SALAZAR talked about doing a home invasion of BALBONTIN and stealing some of the colognes and sell them at flee markets.

NARANJO called SALAZAR on 3 Oct. 02 and the two decided to do the home invasion on 4 Oct. 02.

On 4 Oct. NARANJO borrowed his cousin Francisco HERNANDEZ's car between 0830 and 0900 Hrs. and went and picked up SALAZAR. The two then drove to a Seven Eleven convenience located between Narragansett and Oak Park Aves. on Belmont Ave. From here he called BALBONTIN in order to make sure he was home. After talking with BALBONTIN, the two drove over to the area of BALBONTIN's house and parked their auto on New Castle north of Wellington. The two exited the vehicle and put on the yellow rain slickers. NARANJO said that he noticed a man walking his dog at this time.

The two then walked over to BALBONTIN's house and knocked on the door. NARANJO related that SALAZAR was armed with a pellet gun. NARANJO said that BALBONTIN's wife answered the door. When she opened the door, NARANJO pushed open the door and pushed her down the hallway. He said that he was telling her to be quiet. NARANJO said she began to scream. At this point he heard someone running up the stairs. NARANJO said that he was then struck in the back by Juan BALBONTIN with an object. After hearing thizzing going by his head, NARANJO said that he fled out the door followed by SALAZAR.

As he was flering her heard numerous gunshots. When he reached his auto, he realized that SALAZAR had fallen on Wellington. He then backed up his auto where he assisted SALAZAR into the auto and then they drove off. When he turned eastbound onto the Eisenhower from Central, He dropped the gun out the window onto the pavement. He then dropped SALAZAR off at 47th and Kolin. He said that SALAZAR then walked away to meet up with his friends. He said that he did not see SALAZAR again.

NARANJO said that he then drove to Cook County Hospital for treatment of the gunshot wound he received during the home invasion. NARANJO said that he was unsure if SALAZAR was shot. When questioned about his auto. NARANJO could not explained on why he parked his auto away from the hospital.

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At this point the R/Ds informed NARANJO that they had a witness who said that he helped SALAZAR into the auto. NARANJO then said that SALAZAR was on his knees and that he helped him into the auto. He further said that when SALAZAR exited the auto, he sat on the curb and told NARANJO to go on and that he (SALAZAR) would be okey.

The R/Ds then told NARANJO that the witness stated that SALAZAR did not get into the auto on his own but that NARANJO had put him into the back seat. At this time NARANJO said that he wanted to tell the truth.

NARANJO said SALAZAR was laying in the parkway when he backed up the auto. He said that SALAZAR had been shot and was hurt bad. He said that he then drove to the 45th Street by Kilbourn and put SALAZAR on the curb. SALAZAR told NARANJO that he was okay and that he did not want to go to the hospital. Upon further questioning, NARANJO said that he believed that SALAZAR was dead why he put him on the curb on, 45th Street. He further stated that SALAZAR was not conscious on Wellington and that it was possible that he was dead at that time.

At this time the R/Ds contacted Lt. KEANE and informed him of the content of NARANIO'S interview. As the R/Ds were leaving Cook County Hospital, they were contacted by Sgt. ARGENTINO who informed the R/Ds that body of Juan SALAZAR who resided at 4822 S. Karlov was discovered at 4455 W. 45th Street earlier on 4 Oct. 02. The R/Ds went to this location to observe the scene. They then went to 4822 S. Karlov and met with SALAZAR'S mother, Laura SALAZAR.

The R/Ds were then contacted by Det. ALANIS who stated that NARANJO told him that he had put clothing of SALAZAR into the garbage container behind SALAZAR'S house. This clothing along with other clothing was recovered and inventoried by Bt.#9617. A search for the yellow rain slickers met with negative results.

The R/Ds contacted Felony Review with ASA BRASSIL responding to Cook County Hospital. After interviewing NARANJO, NARANJO gave a video tape statement in the presence of Det. MC DONALD to ASA BRASSIL.

The R/Ds then returned to Area Five where Dets. GRAF and HAGEMANN continued the Thirestigation.

Dear Governor Pritzker and Chairman Findley:

My name is Jorge Montes and I worked for the Illinois Prisoner Review Board for over sixteen years, acting as Chairman of the Board for six of those years. I currently run my own practice, Montes & Associates. I am compelled to write on behalf of an individual convicted through the application of Illinois' overbroad felony murder law, which allows the State to convict people of first-degree murder who did not and never intended to kill anyone. Edgar Naranjo, No. R28771, has served eighteen years of a forty-year sentence for felony murder. I believe Mr. Naranjo's punishment does not fit his crime and strongly support his petition for a commutation.

Mr. Naranjo was convicted of felony murder and home invasion when he and his friend, Johnny Salazar, committed a burglary in 2002. Mr. Naranjo was 26 years old, and Mr. Salazar was 14 years old. The burglary was an ill-conceived attempt to rob a businessman, Mr. Juan Balbontin, of bottles of cologne and then to sell that cologne at the very flea market where Mr. Naranjo's family and Mr. Balbontin's family worked. Armed with an unloaded BB gun, the men rang the doorbell of the Balbontin home and then forced their way into the home when Mrs. Balbontin answered the door. Her cries alerted her husband who confronted the intruders and struck them with a mop. Both Naranjo and Salazar abundoned their crime and fled from the home.

Mrs. Balbontin's cries, however, also alerted her son, Rafael Balbontin, an off-duty Chicago Police Officer, who was in the basement. Officer Balbontin grabbed his auxiliary weapon and ran upstairs. He arrived just as Sahazar and Naranjo were fleeing the house. Officer Balbontin chased the fleeing felons down the street and opened fire on Naranjo and Salazar, striking Naranjo in the hand and killing Salazar with two shots in the back. In total, Officer Balbontin fired eight shots and stopped only after he accidentally shot his own father. Governor Pritzker Chairman Findley February 15, 2021 Page two of three

The Chicago Police Department, through a spokesperson for the Fraternal Order of Police, instantly proclaimed Balbontin a hero, telling the press that Balbontin's shooting was justified because he knew that the men were armed and feared for his life when Salazar turned towards him and took a "shooter's stance." These initial press accounts were highly inaccurate. In a swom deposition taken in connection with a wrongful death lawsuit filed by the Salazar family, Officer Balbontin admitted that he never saw either of the men's hands or arms, and therefore never saw the unloaded BB gun. Moreover, he did not testify that Salazar ever assumed a "shooter's stance;" instead, he testified that when he yelled "Chicago Police, freeze!" Mr. Salazar stopped and made a "furtive movement" in turning toward him. Mr. Salazar's autopsy report further contradicted Officer Balbontin's account, showing that Mr. Salazar had been shot in the back.

A few years after shooting Salazar to death, Officer Balbontin was in the newspapers again. This time, he was arrested and charged with first-degree murder after he stabbed his wife to death and stabbed his mother-in-law when she tried to prevent Balbontin from killing her daughter. For the premeditated murder of his wife, Mr. Balbontin received a sentence of 25 years.

At present, our entire nation is wrestling with the afternath of police killings of men and women like George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, and our own Laquan McDonald. Police investigations into these matters must be done fairly and with transparency and should not be a rush to clear officers in police-involved shootings. Time and time again, in my law practice, I have seen cases where police officers have shot and killed fleeing felons under questionable circumstances. In almost all of these cases, prosecutors reflexively charge defendants like Mr. Naranjo, who did not kill or intend to kill anyone, with felony murder for the death of their co-felons.

Amidst the current conversations about police accountability, allowing the State to continue to punish Mr. Naranjo for Mr. Salazar's death seems like a failure of our system to deliver justice. Sentencing Mr. Naranjo to forty years in prison is excessive punishment that does not fit his crime, especially when it is compared to the twenty-five-year sentence handed out to Mr. Balbontin. It is for this reason that I ask Governor Pritzker to commute Edgar's sentence to time-served. By the time his case is reviewed by the Governor, Edgar will have

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served 19 years in prison, a punishment that is more than sufficient to hold him accountable for his role in the events that led to Mr. Salazar's death.

Thank you for the attention you give this matter.

Through this letter we want to express to you that the problem in which our son Edgar Naranjo got involved – it was something very surprising for my wife, Celia Naranjo, and for myself, Zenaido Naranjo, since our children had never been a problem for my wife and I before, and since our whole life has been spent working so that our children lack nothing. At present, my son, Alejandro Naranjo, and my daughter, Yuri Naranjo, are parents with stable marriages of their own.

When the trial against my son Edgar Naranjo took place, and after some hearings, the judge's verdict of 46 years in prison was carried out – a verdict which I think was unjust, because it was only a home invasion, but unfortunately, there was nothing we could do.

All this has taken 18 years, and every day we ask God that today or tomorrow our son Edgar may have a new opportunity.

That is why we are writing this letter to you, Mr. Governor, so that you can review this petition that Edgar's lawyers will submit, and which the Mexican Consulate supports, so that you can review it, and make a decision that is fair.

We have resided in Chicago for 39 years. My wife, Celia Naranjo, became a citizen of this beautiful country and I only wait for the immigration call to finalize my citizenship, too.

Mr. Governor: 18 long years have passed, and our son has never been a problem within the prison because through this time, he has studied, he has worked, and he now reads the Bible to his peers. That shows that he is not a bad person.

It is for these reasons that we, as parents, write this letter to you, Mr. Governor, appealing to your good judgment.

Mr. Governor: May God bless you and protect you, but above all, may God enlighten you to make a just decision.

To the Mexican Consulate, and to the lawyers who became interested in Edgar's case - our gratitude, since what you all are doing is not for profit. Thank you. May God bless you.

My name is Yuri Martinez and I am the sister of Edgar Naranjo. My parents migrated to this country back in the 80's from Mexico City in search for a better life for their three children. We have always been a middle class hard working family who grew up on Chicago, little village community to be exact. My parents have worked endless days and nights to be able to provide for us and keep us off the streets in these rough neighborhoods.

Edgar was always a good student, hard worker and everyone's friend. Growing up in Chicago we were always surrounded by the good and the bad just like anywhere else in the world and ultimately it comes down to decisions. We were always brought up with good morals and values and we always had respect for my parents and the rules that we had to follow at home. Peer pressure is something that we all live growing up and it's not always easy to stay on track. Edgar had friends from all over the city and he was loved in the neighborhood and known for his willingness to always help the less fortunate.

Edgar was in his mid-twenties when he made the worst decision of his life. He made a decision that changed not only his life but the life of all of us who are his family. Edgar was in a weak moment, not living at home and surrounded by the wrong people. Although Edgars decisions where the wrong ones he did not kill anyone. I understand that he needs to do his time for the felony he committed but to spend 40% in jail for a murder he did not commit is completely wrong. Especially when that same police officer who killed Johnny Salazar, killed his wife almost 2 years after this trial and is now serving life in prison for her murder. This tells you something governor, the laws need to change on a felony murder count and the way our police system is handled is broke. Back when my brother was sentenced we did not see any of the police brutality that we see now. Police officers had no consequences for their actions as we see now. Back then we respected authority and kept quiet. My dilemma with my brothers case is this, how is it possible that my brother is serving a 40% sentence for the death of Johnny Salazar and Johnny Salazar's parents sued the Chicago Police Department for a wrongful death and won millions yet my brother is still in jail.

We have tried to appeal Edgar's case as much as we can afford too. My parents spent all if their life savings to help him and we reached a dead end due to finances. This clemency is the last hope that we have to help Edgar. If Edgar is released he will be deported to Mexico City, there we have already planned for Edgar to have employment with a family member who has his own business. He will also have a home to stay and my parents will also relocate. Edgar is very active in church and we know of several Christian organizations that he can attend. He would like to be a motivational speaker to help others in the community and be a light to someone that is in the dark as he once was.

Governor I by no means think that what my brother did was ok, he committed a crime and yes he should pay for it, but after 18 years of serving his sentence my brother is a new man. My brother is a man of God and all he needs is another opportunity at life. I beg of you to please take a look at the case and what has occurred since the day of the sentence. Please look at my brothers past as he never committed a crime in his life prior to this incident.

Thank you for talking the time to look into this matter and I pray that we have a positive outcome.

PETITIONER EDGAR NARANJO'S RE-ENTRY PLAN

A comprehensive release plan that will provide Edgar with the structural, relational, emotional, and vocational support necessary to facilitate his positive reintegration back into society has been developed. Below, Megan Grenville, Marissa Jackson, and Alix Johnson, second-year Northwestern law students, detail the release plans, in consultation with attorney Steven Drizin.

1. Edgar will have a strong network of family and friends to assist him in his transition back to the community.

The unconditional love and support from Edgar's family has not waivered since he was first incarcerated 18 years ago. His family has consistently visited him in prison¹, spoken to him on the phone, and provided financial support to Edgar. This plan was developed in collaboration with Edgar's family, primarily his sister, who discussed how their family would support Edgar in every aspect of his life: housing, financial needs, transportation, emotional stability, employment, education, and spiritual when he is eventually released. Additionally, Edgar's family is aware of the complexity of the re-entry process and are prepared for any issue that may arise when Edgar is released.

Supportive relationships are crucial for promoting physiological and psychological health among returning citizens because the consequences of stressful relationships or social isolation can entail harm in these health areas.² Families are also key sources of financial

support because many of them provide or assist with finding housing and securing employment.³ Stronger family relationships decrease the chances of returning citizens reengaging with criminal activity and suffering from reincarceration, and thus these family ties improve public safety.⁴ More precisely, stronger familial bonds, marked by affectional ties and feelings of warmth and companionship, are associated with lower desires for deviant behavior.⁵ Aside from tangible resources, family members are important sources of emotional support.⁶ Higher levels of emotional support from family members are associated with an immense reduction in reoffending.⁷

Edgar has maintained remarkably strong connections with his parents and two siblings throughout his incarceration. His mother, Celia, and father, Zenaido, have been unwavering pillars of support and strength for their son. In addition to providing guidance and keeping Edgar up to date on their family's lives through twice weekly phone calls and monthly visits, his parents have been planning for how they can best support him upon his release since he was first incarcerated in 2002.

Edgar's sister, Yuri Martinez, speaks to Edgar every other day on the phone, and visits him at least once a month, most recently two weeks before COVID-19 visitation suspensions were put in place on March 21, 2020. She has been an integral part of the clemency process, and has been the primary point of contact for Edgar's legal team over the past three months. Yuri and Neris, her husband, are willing and ready to provide any type of support Edgar may need from them.

In addition to his mother, father, sister, and brother, Edgar has a supportive family and positive connections with friends in his community, both in Chicago and in Mexico. He has many cousins, aunts, grandmothers, nieces, and nephews all waiting for him to come home so they can help him get back on his feet and be successful. Additionally, Edgar has had the support of his legal and social work team at the Bluhm Legal Clinic since they began representing him in November of 2020, and will provide an additional level of support for Edgar if released.

2. Edgar will have free, secure, and stable housing with his cousin upon release.

Stable housing is imperative for successful re-entry because a lack of this stability can lead to homelessness and to recidivism in the forms of re-arrest and/or reimprisonment.⁸ This is because the strains and stresses from housing instability can result in re-offending as a coping mechanism.⁹ The first month following prison release is a particularly vulnerable period for homelessness and/or recidivism.¹⁰ Housing is often perceived as the foundation for achieving re-entry success due to the fact that housing provides spares for returning citizens to obtain regular employment, desist from crimes, and establish positive health behaviors.¹¹ Furthermore, housing is connected to self-identity in that it allows returning citizens to create economic independence, self-sufficiency, escape the stigmas of prison, and be defined as full citizens.¹²

Because Edgar's legal status expired while he has been incarcerated, upon his release he plans to voluntarily depart for Mexico. He will live with his cousin Gustavo Hernández Ruíz in his home in San Andrés Cholula, Puebla. Edgar will have his own bedroom and will have the full support of his cousin. The address of the home is Calle Tepal No. 3A, Mayaquén, San Andrés Cholula, Puebla 72825. It is located 10km from the work site where Edgar will be employed, and is easily accessible via several public transportation routes.

Edgar's parents plan to re-locate to Mexico and live in a building they own there upon Edgar's release. They, along with Gustavo and their extended family, will provide Edgar with the immediate emotional and financial support that he needs upon release. They are looking forward to spending more time with Edgar and helping him get back on his feet.

3. Edgar will receive employment, vocational and educational training and support.

Workforce development is paramount to the success of returning citizens because employment is directly correlated with reduced recidivism rates, ¹³ and the sooner an

individual is employed post-release, the less likely he/she is to reoffend. ¹⁴ This is because employment focuses these citizens' time with pro-social activities which consequently make them less likely to engage in behavior that could result in a re-arrest. ¹⁵ Additionally, employment "enables individuals to contribute income to their families, which can generate more personal support, stronger positive relationships, enhanced self-esteem, and improved mental health." ¹⁶

Edgar has a plan for employment and training upon his release. Edgar's cousin, Gustavo Hernández Ruíz, owns and operates his own construction company in Puebla, Mexico, Hering S.A. de C.V., which has been a successful business for twenty years. Edgar will engage in both administrative and translation work for Hering while also pursuing his long-term goal of becoming a motivational speaker.

Edgar has taken advantage of every employment opportunity available to him throughout his incarceration and looks forward to bringing his strong work ethic to the job that awaits him in Mexico.

In addition to meaningful employment opportunities, educational services are vital for those re-entering into their communities because education and training not only substantially reduce the likelihood that returning citizens will commit another offense, they also expand the prospects of them finding employment. Edgar has completed 24 credit hours toward his associate's degree through Lake Land College, with seven remaining to complete the degree requirements. He has earned several academic achievement designations through Lake Land ompleted writing skills, restorative justice and prison exchange program courses through Northeastern Illinois University and DePaul University.

All of the skills Edgar has learned through his coursework and work experience will serve him well in his employment and in any future employment opportunities. His networks of support agree Edgar has put in the work to reform himself and is well-positioned to be a successful, contributing member of society.

4. Edgar's strong ties to his faith will assist in his successful re-entry.

Participating in religious programs contributes to positive adjustment while the inmate is in prison and decreases recidivism when released.²¹ Edgar's faith has helped him repent and find peace and purpose. Edgar has done a significant amount of self-reflection and spiritual work while incarcerated, and his faith has become a fundamental, prominent aspect of who he is.

In addition to the courses outlined above, Edgar has completed two religious studies programs through United Christian Bible Institute²² that have impacted his sense of spirituality and outlook on community and restorative justice. Edgar stated that believing in a higher power is necessary for him to make it through his time in prison and face daily obstacles that incarceration presents. For Edgar, his spirituality is a significant strength that will provide him with additional support if released and is a positive coping mechanism that Edgar turns to during difficult times. He plans to attend weekly mass and find community within a local church upon his release and relocation to Mexico.

5. Edgar will have access to affordable, quality medical care.

Another component of the continuum of support upon release from prison is strong medical care.²³ Although Edgar does not report any major medical conditions, it is imperative he receives medical care upon his release. Having access and linkage to community-based medical services will provide Edgar with a continuity of care upon his release.

Edgar will have access to quality medical care for any physical and mental health needs he may have. Edgar's cousin Gustavo will connect him with local providers and assist him in making and attending appointments as needed.
